




The letter "a," as in "apple," makes a short /a/ sound. To make the short /a/ sound, open your mouth wide, drop your jaw, and relax your lips. Rest the tip of your tongue lightly behind your bottom front teeth. Keep your tongue low and slightly forward in your mouth. Turn your voice on.

WHAT'S INCLUDED:

90+ Grapheme Cards

There are over 90 grapheme cards included for different letters/letter combinations. Use these to introduce new sounds and teach the correct articulation.

Each card includes a mouth formation image and articulation script. It also indicates whether the sound is voiced/unvoiced or a continuous/stop sound.

The letter "t," as in "tiger," makes a /t/ sound. To make the /t/ sound, put the tip of your tongue on the bumpy spot just behind your top front teeth. Keep your lips relaxed and slightly apart. Let the air build up behind your tongue and then quickly drop your tongue to let out a small puff of air. Keep your voice off.

The letters "oo," "ew," "ui," and "ue," as in "moon," "dew," "suit," and "glue," make a long /u/ sound. To make the long /u/ sound, round your lips into a small circle and push them forward slightly. Lift the back of your tongue up high toward the roof of your mouth. Keep the tip of your tongue resting behind your bottom front teeth. Turn your voice on and let the sound stretch out.

The letter "a," as in "apple," makes a short /a/ sound. To make the short /a/ sound, open your mouth wide, drop your jaw, and relax your lips. Rest the tip of your tongue lightly behind your bottom front teeth. Keep your tongue low and slightly forward in your mouth. Turn your voice on.

The letters "ch," as in "chick," make a /ch/ sound. To make the /ch/ sound, put the tip of your tongue on the bumpy spot behind your top front teeth. Let the air build up behind your tongue. Then, let the air out. Keep your voice off.

The letter "h," as in "hat," makes a /h/ sound. To make the /h/ sound, open your mouth and let your tongue rest naturally. Then, push out air from the back of your mouth like you are breathing on a window to fog it up. Keep your voice off.

The letters "sh," as in "sheep," make a /sh/ sound. To make the /sh/ sound, bring your teeth close together and round your lips slightly. Lift your tongue toward the roof of your mouth and let the sides of it touch the insides of your back teeth. Blow air out gently. Keep your voice off.

The letter "b," as in "ball," makes a /b/ sound. To make the /b/ sound, press your lips together and let the air build up inside your mouth. Keep your teeth apart. Then, quickly open your lips and let out the air. Turn your voice on.

The letters "oo," "ow," and "oe," as in "boat," "bow," and "oe," make a long /o/ sound. To make the long /o/ sound, start with your tongue in the middle of your mouth and round your lips a little. Then, lift the back of your tongue toward the roof of your mouth as your lips round even more. Turn your voice on and let the sound stretch out.

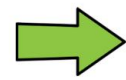

To make the /th/ sound, place your tongue between your teeth so the tip sticks out just a little, like a tongue sandwich. Rest your teeth lightly on your tongue and blow air out between your tongue and your teeth. Keep your voice off.

UNVOICED CONTINUOUS

/oi/
To make the /oi/ sound, start by opening your mouth a little and rounding your lips. Keep your tongue low and pulled toward the back of your mouth. Then, lift your tongue up toward the top of your mouth as your lips relax into a small smile. Turn your voice on.

VOICED CONTINUOUS

/aw/
To make the /aw/ sound, open your mouth, drop your jaw, and round your lips slightly. Keep your tongue low and pulled toward the back of your mouth. Turn your voice on.
